OLD McDonald had a farm...and now so do pupils at De Lucy Primary school.

They are the only children in the borough to have their own farm and their animal attraction is inspiring pupils with all aspects of their learning.

What started as a project where children supervised eggs and baby chicks has turned into a full working farm.

Headteacher Linda Cohen wanted to give pupils something unique and, looking out of the window one day three years ago, imagined a farm right in the middle of the grounds.

Debbie Woodger, the farm manager, said: "We started with the eggs and chickens and that led to ducks and a pond, then we got the goats and we built this space for the animals."

The farm has large pens for a Shetland pony, two pygmy goats, two kunekune pigs and a small pot-belly pig. There are smaller pens for chickens, rabbits, guinea pigs and hedgehogs and a

separate pen and pond for ducks.

"A few of the animals here are rescued, we found our newest animal, Chops the pot-belly pig, running around Abbey Wood and we gave him a loving home.

"We have also taken baby ducks on in the past who need some care and attention before we let them back into the wild," added Mrs Woodger.

The farm has been teaching the children very valuable lessons in taking responsibility for animals and how to behave around animals as well as much more.

Wayne Bushell, aged 9, said: "Every year a different year group gets to do a farm topic and you get to draw and sketch the animals. I drew the pony and my favourite animal is the hedgehog.

Year 6 pupil Alfie Fowler, aged 10, said: "I would like even more animals, perhaps a sheep." Wayne, from Year 5, said: "I would like a giraffe or maybe a zebra."

Mrs Cohen added: "The farm is a very important part of our school curriculum, and where children throughout the school can experience outdoor learning that enhances their life experiences.

"Working closely with the animals helps

the children to appreciate the care and understanding that goes into looking after them. It also assists theirs social skills. The pupils thoroughly enjoy having lessons on the farm and the animals respond very well to the children."
