

ROYAL BOROUGH OF GREENWICH ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984 – SECTION 14(1) TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURES – CANNERRA ROAD, CHARLTON DENE, HORNFAIR ROAD AND INDUS ROAD

1. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Council of the Royal Borough of Greenwich has made an Order to accommodate cartage works in certain roads. The effect of the Order will be to temporarily prohibit vehicles from entering, exiting, proceeding or waiting (including waiting for the purposes of loading or unloading) in:

- Cannerra Road**, between a point 15 metres south-west of the south-western kerb-line of Hornfair Road and a point 15 metres north-east of the north-eastern kerb-line of Hornfair Road;
- Charlton Dene**, between a point 15 metres west of the western kerb-line of Indus Road and a point 15 metres east of the eastern kerb-line of Indus Road;
- Hornfair Road**, between a point 15 metres north-west of the north-western kerb-line of Cannerra Road and a point 15 metres south-east of the south-eastern kerb-line of Cannerra Road; and
- Indus Road**: (i) between the south-western kerb-line of Hornfair Road and a point 20 metres south-west of that kerb-line; (ii) between a point 15 metres north of the northern kerb-line of Charlton Dene and a point 15 metres south of the southern kerb-line of Charlton Dene; and (iii) between the common boundary of Nos. 61 and 69 Indus Road and the common boundary of Nos. 77 and 79 Indus Road.

N.B. the works will be conducted on a "rolling" programme and, as such, not all the restrictions stated in paragraph 1 will be in force in all the affected roads at any one time.

2. Whilst this Order continues in operation the one way working in Indus Road will be suspended.

3. The above restrictions in paragraph 1 and the suspension in paragraph 2 will only apply at such times and to such extent as shall be indicated by the placing of the appropriate traffic signs.

4. Whilst the closures are in operation, the alternative routes for vehicles will be indicated by local signage. Vehicular access to properties affected by these works will be maintained wherever possible subject to the extent and operation of the works.

5. The Order will come into force on 27th August 2013 and will continue in force for up to 18 months, or until the works have been completed, whichever is the sooner. However, it is expected that the works will take approximately 2 months to complete.

Family story is so moving

Woolwich removal firm marks 100 years

ITS horse and cart may have been traded in for a blue van some time ago, but that aside, very little has changed in the 100 years since J.N. Handley & Sons began trading.

"We more or less do the exact same work that my great grandfather did back in 1913, and we work in the same way with the same values and customer service," said Steven Handley, fourth generation of the family that started the removals firm a century ago.

Steven, 47, and brother John, 49, now hold the reins of the company started by their great grandfather, John Handley.

John Snr was a coalman at the turn of the 20th century - a time when Woolwich looked very different from today.

The entrepreneurial Mr Handley struck on the idea of using his horse and coal cart to start a removal service in the borough, and soon began trading in second hand furniture.

In 1913, J.N Handley's of Woolwich was born. The business had its first shop just off of Crescent Road, until Handley's son

relocated the company to Burrage Road. The Woolwich firm then moved into a former wallpaper shop on Vincent Road.

After surviving two world wars and being passed down the family, J.N. Handley & Sons is still going strong. And the shop remains in that same building on Vincent Road, some 45 years later.

Business is good at Handley and Sons, the brothers say. The removals firm has even counted the council among its satisfied customers over the past six decades.

Steven, who began helping out his dad when he was just eight, said: "I am so proud of the company and its history, it's something that's very special to the family and we will definitely have a family gathering towards the end of the year and celebrate."

The firm has also branched out - Steven's uncle runs a Handley's store in Bexleyheath that started more than 10 years ago.
